# **REACT Agreement Approved by Amateur Radio Group**

### **Inflation Forces 1984 Dues Increase**

At their last meeting, the REACT International Board of Directors voted to increase REACT International dues to \$10 for regular members and \$8 for family and junior members effective July 1, 1983, but the increase will not become effective until 1984 registration. Life Member dues will remain at the current rate of \$140 until January 1, 1984, when it will rise to the prescribed rate of 20 times annual dues or \$200. These same rates will apply to all REACT members including those outside U.S. Dues will continue to be at one-half rate for the latter half of the year beginning July 1. This is the present rate of \$5 for all REACT members, everywhere for the period July 1—Oct. 31, 1983.

After reviewing 1982 annual financial results and using that experience to establish a 1983 operating budget, the Board concluded an increase to the \$10 level was unavoidable.

Once having come to that conclusion, the question was how to act responsibly to take a unpopular but necessary, action. It was determined that the obligation of responsible management is to act as soon as the need is recognized, so that full communication can reach the membership in plenty of time for individual REACT Teams to plan for funding 1984 membership dues. It is possible for many Teams to plan fund-raising efforts to subsidize 1984 membership dues.

Among the specific reasons for a dues increase at this time are:

 While we continue to seek outside funding through fundraising and advertising sales, REACT International's one dependable source of income remains membership dues. In addition, dues income is directly proportional to the number of members and the cost of servicing that membership.

The recession has made it more difficult to sell advertising space in The REACTer,

and federal budget cuts for social programs have heightened competition among all

non-profits for financial support from corporations and foundations.

Admittedly, a dues increase may result in loss of membership. We have been losing members every year since 1978, as CB activity diminished and we have to face the presence of other factors working to reduce membership. We need more publicity,

and a recruiting drive that will cost money!

REACT members seek more programs and services, but the Board had to cut
\$41,050 from the 1983 budget proposed by the Executive Director in order to keep budgeted expenditures in line with income we can really count on.
REACT's General Liability Insurance coverage was increased to \$1,000,000. A

Due to inflation, it will take at least \$8.50 in 1984 to equal \$7.00 in 1981!

REACT wants to grow — to attract more members with a program tuned to TODAY. If we are successful in attracting more members, we must charge enough dues to pay for servicing these new members. If we are to grow, we must maintain a financially sound organization, and we must avoid increasing dues too frequently. The new rate is planned to sustain operations without need for additional increases in the near future.

## Oklahoma Team Launches Anti-Drunk Driving Campaign

OKLAHOMA CITY, OK sive campaign was launched in the Oklahoma City area over the New Year's holiday to combat the high number of drunk and impared drivers on the road, in which, the forces of Oklahoma County Emergency REACT/Oklahoma City and University of Oklahoma REACT/ Norman played a major role. Oklahoma County members manned a command post for monitoring both on New Year's ve and during the holiday weekend. University members monitored from the

Communication Center of the Norman Police Department on New Year's Eve. in addition to a Base 5 miles northwest of Norman and also staffed the University Team's Headquarters throughout the weekend. The University members involved with the project spent several hours before the holiday taking special training in visual recognition drunken driving, and in reporting such. Nearly all of the metro area radio and television stations were contacted and ran stories concerning the OU effort.

NORTHBROOK, IL - REACT has just learned, as this issue of the REACTer goes to press, that the Board of Directors of the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) has approved a resolution to: "Facilitate effective disaster communica-tions and to delineate communications responsibilities on the scene of a disaster that the American Radio Relay League effect a memorandum of understanding with REACT International."

Specifically, the action is expected to enhance cooperation of the two groups at all levels - local, regional and national.

It is expected to establish a framework for agreement between the two agencies for emergency and public service communications.

In addition it intended that coordination of facilities, equipment, and personnel of the two organizations will pro-vide better service to the public in natural or manmade disasters, while maximizing the participation of volunteer communicators in the public interest.

According to Executive Director

Gerald Reese: "This is an important action in promoting the further coopera-tion of REACT Teams and amateur radio operators for public service and emergency communications."

"While cooperation has been growing in the field, the establishment of a national agreement will be helpful in convincing amateur radio operators, civil defense communications coordinators, and others that there is a role for

both amateurs and REACT services."
Robert Halprin, Deputy Communications Manager of the ARRL, noted that the agreement will "certainly enhance cooperation at the local level of REACT and the League's Radio Emergency Service and such cooperation will serve the public better.

According to Reese, the way has now been cleared for finalization on a state-ment of agreement calling for cooperation in disaster planning and recognizing the important role played by each agency in responding to emergencies. This effort has been a REACT Headquarters project since 1979!

## **FCC Drops CB Licensing**

WASHINGTON, DC — The FCC, at its meeting on April 27, has acted to eliminate the licensing of CB radio. The effective date of the action — 30 days after publication in the Federal Register, which is expected to be sometime in June.
All REACT members should note two

major points in the action:

1. CB operating rules are still effective.

2. The rules will permit REACT Teams and members to continue to identify with call signs and the REACT Team Identification.

Generally, rules will permit identifica tion with any presently acceptable call.

Details and information will be provided to REACT Teams when the formal document on the FCC action is received. Summit County REACT's Emergency Communications Van was set up as a central command post with a Ham group. Chief Kenneth Klontz of the Akron Fire Department, wanted to see how REACT could communicate during a disaster.

Reading the Mail: Francis Eagan of Waldorf, MD, writes with two valid commen corrections to our January column: (1) He faults me for using a code (10-33) describe an emergency. He argues that with all sorts of interface agencies using all so of code numbers, the call is much more understandable if we use plain English on air and when reporting to the proper source of help. We at Golden Gate feel the sway and request our monitors to do just that — talk plain English. Nevertheless the are a few 10-codes that have crept (past tense of creeped) into our idiom thanks to and that we use as just plain English. Hike 10-4, or 10-8, and we, for one, we rather say 10-100, than tell the world where we are going and what we will try to do Golden Gate we interface regularly with at least six municipalities (police, fire, pu works), one county sheriff, one highway patrol, and the Coast Guard, and frankly you use a number code in reporting to them a problem requiring serious response, twill often come back and interpret the code into "plain talk" to make sure you are say what they think you are saying. So — take the advice that Francis offers you talking to the agencies, plain talk is better than codes!

(2) Francis is a "ham" as well as a CBer, and we assume that he has already for going more than we will ever know. He is N3CYX as well as KOA 2492. We said in Jamu that the radio set converts the audio frequency from your lips into radio freque which it eventually pushes out through the antenna, Francis points out that there is really a conversion but a "superimposition" of the audio frequency on top of the rawaves, where they ride "piggy back." "If you conduct a roll-call on any legal channel other than No. 9, and refrain froffensiveness and profanity, and use normal power to do so, there is nothing in the Fregulation (parts 95) to forbid you, restrict you or fault you."





#### REACT's Response to Chemical Leak Rates Front Page



# REACT International, Inc. Annual Report for 1983

The 1980's are providing a unique challenge for REACT at every level. The original binding force—CB Radio—is in serious decline in numbers of interested and active users. New communication opportunities are in the offing. At the same time, the need for well-organized, training and detires,

opportunities are in the offing. At the same time, the need for well-organized, trained and dedicated volunteers is being recognized at all levels of government and organized society.

The local REACT Team equipped with radios, and the people to man them, provide a valuable capability to serve the community with a wide variety of volunteer services. REACT's challenge is to encourage local REACT Teams to adapt to changing local needs, while maintaining the traditional objectives of Channel 9 monitoring.

At 4:04 p.m.. Wednesday, January 13, 1982, news of the tragic crash of the Air Florida Flight 90 in which 73 lost their lives was flashed to the news media from Washington, DC. With the attention of the world riveted to the news of the crash and the highly dramatic rescue efforts which followed, it was learned that a REACT member Evelyne White, Fairfax REACT Unit 476, was the first to relay news of the crash to the authorities when a motorist on the 14th Street bridge reported the disaster on his CB radio. From the start, REACT was involved in the disaster, both in the initial reporting of the crash, and in the rescue and salvage operation which followed. At 4:04 p.m., Wednesday, January 13, 1982, news

The highlight of the year was the receipt of the President's Volunteer Action Award. Evy White and Henry B. (Pete) Kreer, REACT's founder, received the medal from the First Lady Nancy

received the medal from the First Lady Nancy Reagan in a very impressive ceremony. This was a most fitting way to commemorate REACT's 20th Anniversary Year!

The celebrations continued at the local level and were highlighted at the 1982 REACT International convention in Las Vegas. Over 350 attendees included the most "international" aggregation coming from as far away as the United Kingdom and South Africa.

1982 became a transition year for REACT in shifting from concentration on CB radio to the concept of volunteer public service communications efforts. New horizons loom with REACT's participation in The Neighborhood Crime Prevention Coordinating Committee, the CB Radio Coalition Against Drunk Driving and accelerated vention Coordinating Committee, the CB Radio Coalition Against Drunk Driving, and accelerated involvement with other volunteer agencies in disaster. The formal agreement with the Salvation Army was published to join that already in effect with the Red Cross. REACT continues as a participant in the National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster.

REACT expanded its participation in highway safety efforts through the support of the campaign to encourage use of vehicle safety belts and child safety seats.

to encourage use of vehicle safety belts and child safety seats. Safety Break Time was enhanced through the donation of free coffee in 20 eastern states and the District of Columbia over the Labor Day holiday by Folgers Coffee Company, It was announced that this would be expanded for all the holidate in that eastern perion for 1983

amounted that this would be expanded for an inholidays in that eastern region for 1983.

The continuing decline in Citizens Band Radio was marked by the FCC's proposal to abolish CB licensing and Congressional action to permit it. It appears that this is likely to take place before the

appears that this is likely to take place before the end of 1983.
On the other hand, the possible establishment of a new Personal Radio Communications Service in the 900 MHz band as proposed by the General Electric Company is looked upon by many REACT

Electric Company is looked upon by many REACT members as a new opportunity. The GE program was explained at the 1982 REACT International Convention and encouraged serious and thoughtful support by the membership present.

Financial results, as shown in the audited financial statements below illustrate the difficulties encountered during the recessionary year. Income from membership dues, advertising sales, and grants and contributions were all down. Membership deand contributions were all down. Membership de-clined to approximately 22,000 members. Adver-tising income was down due to recessionary pressures which reduced the advertising budgets of many companies. Grants and contributions declined partly due to the recession and partly due to the greater competition among non profit organizations for the dollars available. This competition resulted from the reduction in federal budgets supporting social service activities of other organizations.

Two income sources presented a more serious

social service activities of other organizations. Two income sources prevented a more serious deficit from developing: 1. REACT was able to obtain a government contract to support our safety belt and child safety seat program. 2. We managed to improve profits of the Official REACT Supply Company.

Company.

The supply company, which is a for-profit subsidiary of REACT International, benefited from our move to larger quarters in Northbrook, Illinois, from our skyscraper office in downtown Chicago. The new space costs approximately the same as the old space, but has warehouse facilities whereby we can store and ship these supplies at a much lower net cost than could be obtained through outside mailing services in the past.

Another important source of income is derived from Life Membership. Through 1982, a total of

from Life Membership. Through 1982, a total of \$15,032 has been raised through this program. It is intended that these funds be invested so that the singular that these funds be invested so that the interest earnings be available as regular income. Life Member dues are regarded as a "reserve fund." During the last quarter of 1982, it was necessary to withdraw some of this investment to pay necessary bills. Once sufficient 1983 dues were paid in (before the end of this year) these funds were replaced in the money market fund, less expenses for Life Member plaques, permanent membership cards and other expenses of the program.

Concentration on reducing expenditures wherever possible, permitted us to escape with a consolidated loss of \$1,843 for the year. This was actually a result of a net loss for REACT International of \$6,725 balanced against net income for Official REACT Supply Company of \$4,882.

Outlook for 1983 projects a still difficult time in building membership. REACT looks to broaden

its membership among volunteer communications who wish to support constructive activities in their community, such as crime prevention, the campaign against drunk driving, other highway safety efforts, and disaster preparedness. How to integrate this expansion and maintain REACT's historic goals is

expansion and maintain REACT's historic goals is a major issue to be resolved in 1983.

The REACTer publication is improved in appearance and format, and is published on a regular bimonthly schedule. This is intended to attract more advertisers, particularly those who supply products and services other than CB radio. REACT members should be highly appreciative of those companies that advertise in The REACTer. The following companies were advertisers in 1982:

## Letters We Like To Get.

CINCINNATI, OH — September 25 and October 9 Ohio Valley REACT 2601 including units of Tri-County, Southern Ohio, and Northern Kentucky REACT working together under the direction of LTC William Y. Conrad (Ret), President of OVR, provided communications support to the Hamilton County Civil Defense Agency in two extensive operations.

The operation on September 25 was based upon a simulated disaster at a public school in Cincinnati which involved response by city fire and police services in addition to CD and amateur and REACT operations.

On October 9 the operation was centered in the City of Blue Ash, far from the center of Cincinnati, where a simulated disaster occurred resulting from the collision of two vehicles in a residential area. One, a truck was loaded with propane gas and the other carried radioactive material. There was not only the danger of a serious fire or explosion but the additional hazard of the "spilled" radioactive materials.

Fire departments of several nearby communities, including Blue Ash, rushed equipment and personnel to the scene along with other emergency teams. 135 residents in the "stricken" area were actually evacuated from their homes to safe collection areas. Some found to be "contaminated" were rushed to hospitals for treatment. In all, hundreds were involved in the extensive operation.

More than a dozen frequencies were pressed into service to handle the myriad communication requirements. In addition to the official services, communication was supplied by CD, Red Cross, Hamilton County Sheriff's department with their complete mobile unit, amateur radio and REACT.

The greater Cincinnati Hospital radio net was activated and operated by amateur radio through a repeater system. Both amateur and REACT stations at the EOC at the Blue Ash City Hall, at the distant site of the disaster and at many other points were in action during the entire exercise handling an endless stream of traffic. Both circuits handled different but related traffic and often there was intercommunication between the amateur and REACT operators. This writer and another REACT member are also hams and hence we had two meter simplex as well as channel 14 capability. A spirit of understanding and cooperation between the two previously rival services was in evidence during the operation. There was an underlying reason for this new relationship which was at long last achieved.

REACT operators are in fact professional communicators and as such should have at their command a professional procedure that will permit their operations to interface with other services. These two exercises marked the first time that OVR members, members of the participating Team, employed radio telephone voice procedures used by amateur, MARS, Military, Airline, and NATO operators.

Still another departure during these exercises was the use of tactical call signs as opposed to the usual "unit six". At periodic intervals the basic FCC call sign was given along with statements that this was in fact a drill and that the content of the messages dealt with simulated conditions.

Finally, these two exercises demonstrated that the operation of several REACT units under a common command is feasible. The various splinter groups do not lose their identity and in groups do not lose their learnity and in fact gain from the experience. It is the view of this writer, the independent REACT organizations in the larger communities cooperate in a program of training so that in the event of a great emergency all contiguous units can function as one. By its very nature REACT represents a valuable resource that can and does serve in times of emergency.
