# Child Safety Seats Sold Out In Just Six Hours

According to Stuart DeLuca, REACT liaison for the event, "We had no idea what to expect. GACPSA ordered the seats from the manufacturer, hoping we would be able to sell at least half of them. But people were lined up ten deep before we were ready to begin the sale, and there were still people in line six hours later when we ran out of seats. If we'd had them, we probably could have sold another fifty or more."

The special sale offered one type of seat, convertible for use with infants or toddlers, at a wholesale price of \$26 plus tax. Comparable seats sell at retail for around \$45.

REACT members helped to provide security and communications between the sales table, set up inside the mall, and the truck on the mall parking lot, where the seats were actually handed out. REACT members also worked in the truck, handing out the seats and safety literature.

The following information, which was taken from a letter to Chief George Straka, of the Concord (CA) Police Department, by Al Singletary, describes the events surrounding Diablo REACT's participation involving a potential disaster resulting from a broken gas line:

At approximately 1725 I received a telephone call from Mr. Warren Estlin, Diablo REACT Unit 39, who informed me at that time of the gas line break, that Willow Pass Road was closed west of Market Street and that Diamond Boulevard was also closed.

He also informed me that he would call Mrs. Lenny Larson, who lives in Lafayette and is not a REACT member, but monitors channel 21 almost every evening from approximately 1600 to 1800 to advise commuters of traffic conditions.

Almost every commuter with a CB radio knows that Roomey (CB handle) will usually have any pertinent information with regards to slowdowns, accidents, stalls, how much of a problem is involved and which alternate route to take if necessary

take if necessary.

Roomey was informed of the situation and immediately began putting the information over the air on channel 21. This was repeated every few minutes.

The people with CB radios were being advised of the broken natural gas line, areas blocked and to take an alternate route if possible within 5 minutes after the break. This information was being received as far west as Orinda.

I immediately started relaying the same information on channels 9 and 17. (My radio will allow me to monitor any channel and scan channel 9 every second). It also transfers to battery power if a power failure should occur. Unit 39 worked channels 9-19 and 21 on the Concord end as necessary.

As soon as Mr. Kenneth Baker, Diablo REACT Unit 63, arrived home, he monitored 19 and 21 to replace Mrs. Larson who had signed off the air.

Within minutes the commuters were reporting back to us with information as to which roads traffic was moving well on or if jammed up, and what kind of a delay was involved.

We diverted traffic over Pleasant Hill Road, Treat, Monument, etc.

As the information was received, we would update the situation and advise the people still out on the road.

Even though we were following the entire sequence of events on our scanners, we wanted official notification to eliminate the possibility of putting premature information over the radio.

Chief, you may not be aware of the number of CB radios that people have installed in their vehicle for road information and safety while on the road. I insist that my wife have her CB in her

I insist that my wife have her CB in her car when on the road on a trip or out at night.

It is also a practice for some commuters who do not have a CB radio in their vehicle to follow vehicles which have CB antennas, if any unusual number of CB people suddenly start leaving the freeway and they see traffic starting to

Diablo REACT has followed the same procedure several times in the past, trying to help the California Highway Patrol

due to a major freeway problem.

The tanker that blew up in the Caldecott Tunnel would be the most memorable. I talked to CHP officer Chuck Dalecki, who is the public affairs officer for our area, and since CHP had no serious traffic problems they also benefited from the action that was taken.

At 2019 I received notification from Pleasant Hill P.D. that the roadways were open and that it was O.K. to put out over the air that conditions were normal. This was done.

### QUALITY OR QUANTITY — MUST WE CHOOSE ONE?

In our desire to expand REACT's membership and make more growth possible other radio services, to join REACT, it has been assumed by some that it is our intention to open the door to anyone who wishes to pay dues. This is not the objective. It is REACT International's position that any expansion of eligibility need not compromise REACT's high standards of quality Team performance.

REACT members have achieved a professional level of communication skills which was do not intend to compromise.

membership.

What is your Team doing to attract quality members to your Team?

At a time when all REACT Teams are interested in attracting new members, how do you rate with perspective members who visit your Team?

What kind of image does your Team project? Think about the impression a visitor gets from your Team.

1. Where do you meet? Is it an attractive business like setting? Is it at the same place at the time? Do you meet in members homes?

I have attended Team meetings in a variety of places. These include police stations civil defense headquarters, Red Cross Chapters, VFW Posts, banks and savings & loans, members homes, apartment building community rooms, union halls, even ε court room. Whatever the meeting room, it should be well lit, with comfortable seating and attractive surroundings — preferably a business-like setting.

2. What kind of impression do your members make to a visitor? What is there appearance? Are they in a REACT "uniform?" Are they well groomed? Are they friendly? Do you make the guest feel welcome?

Everyone should make the guest feel welcome. There should be specific members assigned to involve the guest in the meeting, introduce him to other members, and to address his special interests and needs.

What is your meeting format? Is it interesting, entertaining or boring? Let's face it ...

most meetings are boring!

The ideal meeting is a balance between formal and informal with a high interest level. There should be some balance of business/education/entertainment. Do you serve refreshments? Do you vary the format?

Some business is necessary, but keep it short! By handling difficult issues at Board meetings and having good committees, general business meetings can be short and sweet! (As contrasted with long, bitter and painful!) Sometimes you can't avoid a controversial issue. If you have guests, call a recess, get the disputing parties to agree to come to the next Board meeting to debate it, and get on with the rest of the meeting. Often, it is simply the desire to be heard that must be satisfied.

4. Do you follow up on your visitors? Is someone specially assigned to call and/or write a thank you to the guest for coming and asking him to join? You can't make the sale if you don't ask for the order! You may wish to put the prospective member on the mailing list for a limited period of time to receive your Team bulletin. Invite them to participate in social events and communications activity. Get them involved and sign them up!

### Break Response Proves Surprise to Carolina REACT



### Nuts & Bolts on 27 megs

When I first though about this column, the ideal of "How to Triangulate" was uppermost in my mind. Now, with an obvious change in FCC attitude, it is an absolute necessity.

Firstly, what has happened to the FCC? Whether they have suddenly "Gotten or whether the switch in responsibility for enforcement from Washington, DC to the field offices, or whether the addition of a contact representative from the public service staff to the field offices has done the trick, we have reason to believe, gained through an invited visit to the FCC field office and a visit as a public speaker to our Team monthly meeting on their part, that the field offices are willing to take action against your "Problem CBer."

They are now empowered to bring down upon his head fines of up to \$750, if, for rexample, if he is Rnowingly interfering with an emergency transmission on Channel 9. The three current cardinal sins are, (1) over power, (2) operating over, below, or inbetween the existing 40 channels, and/or (3) using language which is offensive to the

sensibilities (swearing or using profanity).

We have been told that the FCC will accept "recommended targets" from us, but—

(1) Without our becoming "vigilantes," (2) they would like us to track down this target to the equivalent location of one city block.

This, or course, means that we have to track down the target through *triangulation*. Oversimplification would call for two or more of your Team members to stand in front of their homes and point and say, "He is over there." Where the fingers cross is probably the location you want.

Actually the process is just that, with a little refinement to start with, each member with a beam contacts his local city engineer and obtains the latitude and longitude of his own beam location. It will read something like: West — xx hours, yy minutes, zz seconds, and North — aa hours, bb minutes and cc seconds. Next, one or more of the net members (members with beams) will obtain maps of your locality, which are based on latitude and longitude. This type of map is usually "topographic," showing mountains, valleys, rivers, etc., but no streets or houses. The map you want for street locations can be gotten, from gasoline companies or from AAA. Someone now has to get the "city engineer" to correlate the two maps. We suggest that he help you put latitude and longitude lines on your regular city and highway may. Rand McNally area maps show latitude and longitude.

Now refer to the accompanying chart which looks a little like a map of the heavens.

Now refer to the accompanying chart which looks a little like a map of the heavens. Let us assume that four members have volunteered to be part of the "triangulation net." One member, hopefully one who understands what I am talking about, plots the positions of the four (two or more) on the corrected map according to their L & L coordinates (A, B, C and D). The plotter makes sure that there is a north south line, parallel to the map "compass rose" through each plotted location.

Now, someone starts talking on channel 6 each evening with so much power that he makes it difficult if not impossible to take a call on Channel 9. The communications officer, or net control alerts the triangulation net and two members respond. Member "B" reports that he finds the "target" the loudest at 232 degrees from magnetic north. The net controller then, using a simple "protractor" (every kind has one for school) plots these lines on the map and comes up with target #1. If you are using a city street map, with superimposed L & L lines, you can now read the city (or county) location near where he probably is. Three crossing lines or four crossing lines will obviously more closely reveal his location. more closely reveal his location.

On the chart we have shown target #2, located by azimuth lines from members A, C & D. We have also shown an ideal "triangulation" (quadrangulation) on target #3 with azimuth lines from four members.

Step two is for one of your members, admonished to stay in his car and not to go knocking on doors, to mount one of the gold line Signal Hunters (see Ad on Page 2), or an equivalent range loop on his car, to drive through the indicated area during the indicated time spans and try to reduce the target area to one city block.. (Maybe even


indicated time spans and try to reduce the target area to one city block. (Maybe even the correct street address can be targeted.)

Now that you have the target located, you should turn in to the public service staff member at your closest FCC field office, as much info as you can: location, channel used, time he can be found, handle used, what he is doing wrong, and why he is a target for your Team. Your public service staff member will want your complaint in writing, but he/she would also like to talk to you, so don't hesitate to phone and let the FCC office know you are sending in the paperwork. Of course, let them know who you are, who you represent and how you can be reached. Then, as one old FCC friend put it, Step aside and let us nail him.

Note to my "nuts" correspondents: I realize that the map and the location L & Ls are in true north, and the beams and azimuths will be in magnetic readings, but let's walk before we run. # COLUMN NINE Where the REACTion is Yours

### PAYING DUES

There is an organization in town that holds meeting once a week, often with standing room only crowds. This group paid no dues for membership or any other reason. At one meeting a motion was made to establish a system of membership dues of \$15 annually. This motion created quite a controversy, because the members would be obligated to pay dues. The discussion went on for awhile, sometimes quite strongly, both pro and con. One gentleman over in a corner had not said a word. Finally, he got up and asked, "Why not make the dues \$25 a year, or maybe yet \$35 or \$40 a year?" This really raised a

When he was finally able to be heard again he said, "If somebody told me that I had to pay \$15 or \$25 a year to belong to this group, I would walk right out of this building. But just like the rest of you, I am paying \$52 a year to come to these meetings. You see, every week, we pass the hat for a collection to pay for this room, plus any other expenses. Most of us put \$1 in the hat, some put more. At \$1 per week, that is \$52 per year, except for the two or three weeks that we don't meet. Now, do you want to leave it at \$52 or continue arguing about \$15?

At this point the motion was withdrawn, and the group concentrated on other topics.

The purpose of the above story (which is true by the way), is that it could have been REACT that the story was about! How? Let's see now — every time the dues of members are raised \$2 or \$3 a year, there are those who complain that it is too much. Starting January 1, 1984, our Team dues are \$2, plus \$10 for REACT International for a total of \$12 a year. That is \$1 a month, or less than 25¢ a week.

Many of the objectors forget that at each Team meeting, they buy a 50-50 ticket for \$1, which is an additional \$12 a year for a total of \$24 a year. Based on these figures, why is there any objection to the dues increase?

How much would it cost you to buy \$1,000,000 worth of insurance to protect you from something you might do accidently?

How much would it cost you to subscribe to the REACTer per year?

How much would it cost you to get your ID printed?

There are other items that your dues pay for also. Could you get all this for less than \$12 a year?

"And now," as Paul Harvey says, "for the rest of the story." Think it over, and let's all back REACT International!

### Team Piays Big Part in Passage of Safety Laws

MARION, NC — McDowell County REACT Team 2632 is proud to have had a part in two new laws that were passed in North Carolina in 1983. In one law no one except traffic control personnel could hold Safety Breaks on Interstate 40. The REACT Team was knocked out of a Safety Break because a CB club had applied for it, then backed out.

The other law was most important to REACT in North Carolina, as of January 1983, no one could direct traffic in North Carolina on the highway unless they were a certified law officer. This meant no REACTer could legally stop a car or direct traffic. So McDowell went to work getting this law changed. With the law officers in McDowell County along with Bob Hunter, House Representative from Marion, on June 1, 1983 the law was changed. The law now states that to direct traffic, you had to have adequate insurance which REACT International provides, and go to Traffic Control school for six hours under a certified traffic control officer. You could then go back on the road directing traffic. This law only applies to North Carolina. The McDowell REACT Team is now the only Team qualified to direct traffic in this county. There are 16 members who took this schooling and who are handling the whole McDowell County.

### Team Fights Back to Gain Strength

The "CB boom" of the mid-seventies has been dead for quite some time now, and it has become increasingly difficult to generate much interest or enthusiasm in the medium: new members are harder to find, old members are harder to keep, funding is scarce, activities are fewer.

For a while, there was quite a bit of confusion, as powers further up the line thought that consideration should be given to amateur operators rather than "CBers." We are very proud that the Ottawa-Carleton branch of the Red Cross felt that 15 years of service meant more than the potential superiority of a heretofore disinterested group.
