Hurricane Gilbert puts REACT in Action

Hurricane Gilbert made a path through the Gulf and left in its wake a path of crisis and devastation. Fortunately for several areas affected REACT was there ready to respond and respond they did! REACT Trinidad and Tabago (selected islands located just off the coast of Venezuela) maintained around the clock monitoring of the Hurricane's direction through the Camen Islands. The Puerto Rican REACT Council gathered its Teams, already tired from an earlier tropical storm that did a lot of flooding, and again evacuated people to higher ground. They also provided emergency communications as hurricane winds damaged most of the antenna and phone lines. REACT in both countries were interviewed by USA Radio News Network carried on over 400 stations nationwide.

On to Texas

All along the Texas coast REACT Teams prepared for the worst as Hurricane Gilbert increased its devastating size and speed. Here are the reports from a few of the many Texas Teams that went into action.

SAN ANTONIO, TX — During the week of September 12-18, 1988, the Texas coast was threatened by Hurricane Gilbert, the strongest hurricane in the history of NOAA Weather. The local REACT Teams mobilized and made plans to prepare for the storm.

On Tuesday (9/13) a meeting was called by Frank Graves (Area V REACT Council President) to be held with representatives from the San Antonio Emergency Operations Center (EOC), Guadalupe County REACT #3622 (GCR), Bexar County REACT #2708 (BCR), Explorer Post 700, Traffic Central, and the Red Cross Amateurs.

At that long four hour meeting, much groundwork was laid for incorporating both REACT Teams' communication capabilities into San Antonio's emergency contingency plans. This included plans to install a Guadalupe County REACT GMRS Radio in the City's EOC, the use of REACT and Post 700 volunteers to man checkpoints on all major routes into the city to greet the evacuees, and to provide traffic information to the authorities. REACT would also play a vital part using Channel 9 monitors to help spread information to motorists and to

handle the increased number of calls expected. Secondary plans also included using REACT members to observe selected low water crossings to relay information back to the EOC for determining flooding conditions in the city, and to spot for tornadoes, if conditions warranted the precaution.

Wednesday evening, while the Disaster Committee for San Antonio held their meeting, Guadalupe REACT installed a GMRS radio at the EOC. The number of REACT monitors from both Teams on emergency CB Channel 9 was increased to handle the increasing number of emergency reports to the authorities.

The Guadalupe County Com Van was prepared for use, and all radios were tested. The presidents of both REACT Teams conferred frequently by radio, phone, and in person in order to coordinate the actions of each team.

Lee W. Besing (GCR President) established contact with the presidents of the Corpus Christi REACT Team, Jay Stout, the Kingsville REACT Team, Richard McDaniel, and the Victoria County REACT Team, Jerry Clifford. Information was collected from these other team presidents and relayed to local EOC and news media upon request. Richard McDaniel was also in charge of the Naval Air Comm Station in Kingsville, and was able to provide first hand information from his post. Jay Stout was stationed in a storm shelter in Corpus Christi with a CB antenna outside, and relayed continuous reports on weather conditions.

Assistance from San Angelo REACT, and several other REACT Teams in Texas was offered, but their offer was kept on standby, until the extent of the storm was determined. On Saturday (9/17), when it had been established that San Antonio would be spared the brunt of the hurricane, they were informed that they would probably be needed more in their own home areas due to the storms moving through Texas towards the northwest.

The FCCLicensing division in Gettysburg, was FAXed with a "STA" request for emergency radio operations on GMRS radio by Guadalupe County REACT, as a Team on continued on page 4

462.700 MHz GMRS. This was granted on

Thursday (9/15).

Tom Davilia of the U.S. Postal Service in San Antonio contacted Guadalupe County REACT on Wednesday asking for assistance from REACT Amateur Members to establish contact with their Corpus Christi Post Office which was establishing an Amateur Station at their location. (Tom was the person responsible for arranging the 25th Anniversary REACT Cancellation Stamp at the 1987 Convention.) Arrangements were made for REACT to establish a 40 meter net to Corpus Christi, with local 2 meter and GMRS communications.

Gary Lebo (WDSJVU) and Leroy Giddings (KBSCDG), along with the welcomed assistance of Joe Cline (KNSU), and Terry Growell (WD9BJR) were able to successfully establish contact with Gene (KF5QB) at the Corpus Christi Post Office, and maintained their net for the Post Office beginning 8 a.m. Friday morning, and continuing until 1 a.m. Saturday.

Lee Cook (WA8WNK), who is also an Air Force MARS unit, contacted Joe Cline (KNSU) at 10:55 p.m. to ask REACTs help in organizing, via 75 meters radio, a local amateur search party to look along the Texas/Mexico border for two missing Coast Guard Cutters, known to be on the Rio Grande River north of Brownville, but who had lost radio contact with their base. While Joe was organizing this search, the cutters sent some men ashore to make contact, and they flagged down a motorist who happened to be one of the amateurs preparing to search. Also, coincidentally at the time, the cutters were able to reestablish radio contact with their base due to changing radio conditions.

Brian Wright, Robert McNeill (KBSAQD) and Lee Besing installed a backup repeater on the new 32 story NBC Bank Tower under construction at Soledad and Pecan. The GCR Team's generator was readied to provide backup power. This was enabled through the generous cooperation of John Turnage of Century Development Corporation and installation help from Donald Rutledge of Zachery/Bellows. A custom-made bracket for mounting the repeater antenna on a window washer suspension unit was build and donated by Eureka Sheet Metal (Manual Elizondo).

Kennedy & Associates, the owners of the 462.675 repeater used by REACT in San Antonio, offered their assistance in monitoring the repeater on a 24 hour basis, and to send a technician out to repair the repeater if damaged during the storm. They also offered to rewire the repeater to allow an emergency backup generator to be used in the event of power failure.

At 8 a.m. Thursday, the REACT command post and Post 700 com van was established at the Gardendale Volunteer Fire Department on the southeast side of San Antonio. This post was manned by various Post 700 members, and Guadalupe County REACT members, and monitored REACT Traffic on GMRS and CB, Fire Department Radio Traffic, and various amateur 2 meter frequencies as well.

On Friday morning [9/16] at 2 a.m., GCR president Lee Besing, was called by the San Antonio EOC requesting assistance in providing radio operators for Red Cross Shelters. Unfortunately, due to previous commitments, GCR was not able to provide any operators, however a plea was made on KTSA Radio by Lee to ask for amateurs to volunteer to assist the Red Cross directly.

On Saturday morning (0425 hours), while everyone in the EOC was relaxing, believing that the worst was over, reports of multiple tornado strikes, heavy thunderstorms, and flooding in some areas of the county, started pouring in by radio to the EOC. REACT members manned their radios and relayed reports via GMRS to the EOC. One of the first reports of confirmed tornado damages came through Bexer County Fire Alarm Radio continued on next page

from Sandy Oaks VFD, at 0550 hours, and was relayed by the REACT post at Gardendale VFD via REACT GMRS Radio to the

city's EOC.

On Saturday, San Antonio was declared to be a disaster area, primarily due to the extensive damage involving three major hospitals, several housing subdivisions and apartment complexes, plus Kelley Air Force Base. Total damages were estimated in excess of \$35 million.

When the EOC was deactivated at 4 p.m. Saturday, Guadalupe County REACT switched control to the REACT Com Van. The fire chief and several other city officials, including the mayor, personally came over to thank us for being there to help.

This "exercise" proved the reliability of REACT's operations and the abilities to combine communications from CB radio, GMRS radio, and Amateur radio. During the operation, several radio volunteers came forth to offer their services with CB, GMRS, and Amateur radios. Membership applications are pending and most should be processed by the September 26th meeting. These additional volunteers made a big difference in REACT's response to the emergencies.

REACT maintained a high level of publicity, with both KTSA RADIO and KSMG RADIO using Guadalupe County REACT as a news source and for announcements. GCR president Lee Besing was on KTSA for numerous live and taped interviews about what REACT was doing to aid the situation Robert McNeill (KBSAQD) was interviewed about the new 462.700 GMRS repeater, while Gary Lebo (WDSJVU) and Joe Cline (KNSU), were interviewed regarding the

REACT/Postal Connection.

KTSA radio also interviewed Richard McDaniel, president of the Kingsville REACT Team for live interviews from down there, and local PSA announcements were made in Corpus Christi and surrounding areas to advise evacuees to contact REACT in San

Antonio using CB Channel 9.

Kingsville REACT #4682 was prepared. For the past year various members of our team have been attending meetings with the Kleberg County Civil Defense director Mr. Merced G. Garcia and other Kingsville City/Kleberg County agencies. These meetings included training and a table-top disaster drill. Most of our team was also able to attend a 3 day course at Texas A&I University, May 1988 entitled "Texas Dept. of Public Safety SHELTER SYSTEM MANAGER". Knowledge gained from these meetings and training experiences payed off during the preparation and actual hurricane periods during the week.

The following information is provided on actions taken by Kingsville REACT. Assisted Kleberg County Sheriff Dept. in notification of evacuation of low lying and flood plains area of Loyola and Riviera Beaches of the country. Established the Emergency Management Central Ch 9 communications base

station at the Court House EOC using AM/SSB CB radio and the existing cable and ground plane antenna establishing a Ch 9 CB AM/SSB radio at the Kingsville High School shelter. Established emergency shelters in accordance with EOC guidelines at the two cities of Ricardo and Riviera which are south of Kingsville. Assisted a stranded motorist by taking them to a relatives house. Established Emergency Chl 9 AM/SSB CB radio and Big-Stick antenna at the Kingsville Fire Department. Established Emergency Chl 9 AM CB radio and ground plane antenna at the Texas A&I University shelter. This shelter had 400 total evacuees and shelter operations personnel. Established an alternate CB radio and antenna system at Kleberg County Veterans Administration Office in the Court House. Informed the local radio and TV stations of San Antonio shelters/road information sources received from Guadalupe REACT. Established Emergency Chl 9 AM/SSB CB radio and a 11/2 wavelength center feed dipole antenna at the NAS Communications Center. The 52 foot wire antenna was stretched 8 feet off the ground with the flat side towards Kingsville. An alternate 1/2 wavelength antenna was stretched inside a long passage way outside the CommCenter rooms. Took a call on Ch 9 the night of 16 Sept. from a group of Houston based Ham Radio Operators running low on gasoline. Ended up supplying the fuel due to no service stations open in Kingsville. The Hams were on their way to Brownsville, Texas with radio equipment and antennas for the hurricane aftermath in that area. About 30 minutes later took a call over Ch

16 LSB from the Hams about an auto accident on Hwy 77 south bound 25 miles south of Kingsville. Established Emergency Ch 9 AM/SSB CB radio and 1/2 wavelength dipole wire antenna at the Kingsville High School shelter. This shelter had 46 total evacuees and shelter operations personnel. Established Emergency Channel 9 AM/SSB CB radio and whip antennae at the Gillette Grade School shelter. This shelter had 340 total evacuees and shelter operations personnel. A surprise check into the REACT/EOC Emergency Communications net was made the NAS Kingsville Hurricane Command Center at the Base Operations Building. This was an excellent idea for interaction between the U.S. Navy and the emergency communications personnel outside the Naval Air Station.

Most of the REACT Emergency Communications operators either had car batteries or emergency generators for radio operations should the AC power fail. All communication links were considered excellent except for periods of maximum Skip Conditions from outside Texas or the United States. Many long distance radio signals were received on Ch 9. Single Side Band was used on several occasions to communicate locally. On some occasions our team used relay procedures to pass messages.

Kingsville REACT President Richard W. McDaniel received a long distance telephone call from the KTSA 550AM radio station in San Antonio and went on the air live for questions about what REACT was doing here in Kingsville, what the weather

HEADQUARTERS REPORT

89 Dues are due. Your Team should receive its 1989 renewals by first class mail in early November. Complete the renewal information in full and return it with your dues to be eligible for the REACT renewal lottery.

89 Dues are: (North American Teams, U.S. & Canada) \$12.00 per regular member, \$10.00 per family or junior member. The Team insurance fee is \$17.00 for liability and bonding coverage. European Teams are \$25.00 Team fee and \$5.00 per member.

\$\$ Get In on the REACT Renewal Lottery \$\$ In the past years we have provided each Team who renewed by December 31st a chance at the early bird prizes. 1989 renewal will give each and every (North American) Team more chances at a renewal prize. One chance is entered for each Team who fully completes the following categories:

One chance — for sending in your initial renewal with several members and Team fee by December 31st.

One chance — for completing the Team information report.

□ One chance — for completing the 1989 Team officer report.

One chance — for 100% renewal (1989 renewal compared to 1988 ending membership numbers).

One chance — for each 10% increase in membership over the previous year (1989 renewal compared to 1988 June records).

To be eligible all renewal information must be complete, with proper dues and Team fees paid. (Only one prize awarded per Team.) Renewal contest ends and all information must be received by January 31, 1989.

We are trying for alot of prizes (like last year) to give more Teams a chance to win. If you know of someone (dealer, manufacturer, etc.) who would like to contribute a tax deductible donation and receive international publicity for such, please have them contact our office.

Teams dropping members must state the reason the person is being dropped: deceased, moved away, joined another Team (give Team name & number) for cause, removed by membership for cause or lost interest, etc. This will enable REACT HQ to remove such persons names from certain mailings. Persons dropped without a reason stated will be treated as "lost interest" and subject to mailings.

Team's public relations goes national: San Fernando Valley REACT #C183 of Supulveda, California signed up a new member this year who went head over heels about REACT. The new member suggested the Team advertise their public service on TV and ask for interested persons to join. The new member is Bobby Sherman who produces and directs commercial, industrial films. TV specials and records from his own production company. Bobby is famous for his two year role as Jeremy Bolt on ABC's "Here Come the Brides". He also turned out a series of records, twelve of them went gold, and he has appeared on TV shows Shindig" and "Getting Together". The result is a 30 second Public Service Announcement spot promoting REACTs' monitoring of CB ch 9 and invitation for persons to join REACT. This spot is already appearing on several Southern California stations

Bobby is working on a new makeover for REACT International use. Starting out the new international spot will appear on WWOR of New York and TBS of Atlanta, both independent "Super Stations". More later about the availability for local Team use.

New REACT apparel designs have been viewed and commented on by Teams from several states. The jacket, shirt and hat designs are now being bid upon for availability in early 89. If you are thinking about new REACT apparel, we urge you to wait for our new designer line.

Additional policies:

Orders for REACT supplies are always handled as if they are from and for the Team. Individuals may place orders directly with REACT HQ. However they must meet the minimum order quantities and all other requirements. Problems with an order, insufficient checks, debits, and credit certificates are referred back to the ordering person's Team. We can not afford to deal on an individual basis with 12,000 members, when it is much more economical to deal with around 800 Teams. REACT supply

catalogs are available for \$1.00 each. Price includes catalog, price list, order form and shipping and handling charges.

Orders by phone must use a VISA or MasterCard, no COD orders are accepted. Rush orders are subject to extra shipping and handling charges.

All Items offered are priced without shipping and handling charges. S&H charges are figured based on weight of the total items ordered. Unit weight is shown on the minimum quantity available (usually each). Higher order quantities must figure the total weight of all items ordered. This is where most mistakes are made, possibly delaying your order.

New REACT assistance cards now available at same price.

New REACT dry decal sheets — \$2.00 a sheet (1 oz each) plus S&H of 26 triangular logos in three sizes.

WORLD BAND RADIO

Spotlighting Trans World Radio, a religious broadcaster, which began in North Africa over 30 years ago as the Voice of Tangier. When Tangier was returned to Morocco, TWR began boadcasting from new shortwave facilities leased from Radio Monte Carlo. They later built a station on Bonzire, Netherlands Antilles, in the Caribbean and leased air time from radio Ceylon (now Srilanka). Still later TWR added a station in Swaziland (Africa), leased air time over Radio Monte Carlo - Middle East on Cyprus and built KTWR on Guam.

TWR can be heard very well anywhere on Earth over one or more of these stations. The Bonzire station is on every evening to North and South America on shortwave. Bonzire also broadcasts on 800 KHz medium wave for the Caribbeam and that can sometimes be heard if you don't have another strong

station on the frequency.

Trans World Radio does have nice GSLs for each station and always verifies correct reports. They do appreciate return postage. Speaking of return postage, except for the big government broadcasters and communist bloc stations, it's usually a good idea to enclose an International Reply Coupon from the Post Office. An IRC is currently 95¢ in the U.S. Some countries don't accept IRCs (South Africa for instance) and a small South American station might not know what they are. A U.S. dollar bill is a substitute in most cases but foreign currency is illegal in some countries (Peru, Mexico etc.). There are a few suppliers who sell mint stamps from various countries.

You see that collecting QSL cards can get expensive. An alternative is to collect the rare or exotic stations with a tape recorder as you hear them. As it is, more and more stations won't QSL or just send a reply card (non-QSL, QSL card). So you might want to put some on the wall before the QSL card

becomes extinct

Monitoring Tips

by Ms. Sarah J. Leach CB Communications Task Group

Before you start talking on channel 9, listen to make sure it is clear of emergency traffic. This also means to see if someone else is switching to other channels and what channel they are using.

The REACT members should, if at all possible, try to keep channel 9 "free" of non-emergency traffic. If you do have other traffic, then go to one of the other 39 channels and use them instead. When changing channels, have the other person "hold" on the channel that you met him her on. You as the REACT member should check to see if the other channel is free for you to use, then go back and ask the person to go to that channel with you.

For those members who have indoor antennas, they should be checked once every three or four months to make sure that all of the connections are tight and that the cable has not been pulled in any way.

For those members who have outdoor antennas they shou'd be checked even more frequently because a connector or the antenna itself may have come loose

Gateway Area REACT #2001 — St. Louis, Missour! Helps at Train Derailment:

On Saturday, August 6, 1988, approximajely 50 miles north of St. Louis at Elsberry. Mo. a train derailed. Missouri State Council President and Gateway's Unit 18, Bill Marshall, heard about the derailment at about 11 a.m. Even though it took place at about 6:30 that morning, Elsberry was calling for more assistance from St. Louis and St. Louis County for fire equipment and personnel as the derailed cars had run into several storage tanks filled with various chemicals used in fertilizers and a diesel fuel tank. The diesel fuel tank had already ignited and was burning; and the other tanks were close enough that the danger to life and property was imminent. Elsberry evacuated about half their citizens and all available police and fire personnel were needed to block off the danger zone and try to contro the fires.

Unit 18, Bill Marshall and Unit 27, "Mac" Miller responded to Elsberry and offered assistance They were requested to handle radio communications. Bill handled the police radio and "Mac" was put on Mutual Aid Fire radio. There they stayed until approximately 7:30 p.m. Sunday, August 7. At that time the fires were under control.

Immediate danger from Toxic fumes was much less, and their own personnel were free to take over.

With all the different agencies that responded such as Fire, Police, Red Cross, etc., they may or may not remember that the two guys from St. Louis who handled radio communications so effectively were REACT. They once had a REACT Team up in Elsberry called Lincoln Pike REACT. The Team did not renew their charter for various reasons, however some of the past members were out there helping. Now maybe, just maybe, some of that spirit might just rekindle a desire for the Team to reactivate.

#3880 Muskegon County REACT, Muskegon, Michigan, had a great coffee break on the Fourth of July weekend. We were really busy right to 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 3; then the traffic dropped off.

We took part in the Muskegon County Art Fair Juuly 16 and 17. They had a very good show with two of the world's largest airplanes on display. One of them even took off and passed over the airport two or three times.

Pittsburgh REACT #2844 team members give assistance to National Wheelchair Games

When Pittsburgh REACT member Bill Gracey was a volunteer for the 1985 National Wheelchair Games, the annual U.S. championships for disabled athletes, communication was a problem.

"They sent messages across the university's campus by way of a small child running from building to building," says Gracey. "It was far from adequate."

Things were different at the 1988 National Wheelchair Games, which were again held at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania near Erie, Pa. This time, Ptitsburgh's North Hills REACT team members offered their help to Harmarville Rehabilitation Center, the health care facility co-sponsoring the games.

Four men, Bill Gracey, Bob Ross, Art Lynch and Ken Little, monitored communications 24-hours-a-day for the entire eight-day event. They set up two base stations: one in the campus field house and one in a dormitory on the other side of campus. Twelve walkie talkies were also used by those coordinating the games. According to Gracey, communication was improved immeasurably, and, although none occurred, they were prepared in the event of an emergency.

A North Hills REACT members for 12 years, Gracey currently volunteers his services two days a week helping disabled adults at Harmarville Rehabilitation Center in Pittsburgh, where he and other REACT members operate a CB radio program for patients.

The Harmarville program is the third project Gracey began after implementing a radio communications program at the Veterans Administration hospitals in Pittsburgh. He began that program eight years ago when he was volunteering his services and observed how quiet two roommates became after they were fogether for a month.

"I went to the staff and said, "Hey, we have to get these guys talking"," Gracey recalls. With that, Gracey prepared a syllabus to

With that, Gracey prepared a syllabus to teach a CB orientation course and established what has come to be known as the "Vet Net."

The program, sponsored and coordinated by the Pittsburgh North Hills REACT, Inc. Team #2844, trains veterans how to use the CBs. Team members also attach the CBs and antennas to the veterans' wheelchairs. In addition, they established contacts in the nearby community who would serve as a one-on-one communication link for each individual veteran.

The second communication program, again sponsored by North Hills, was established at another veterans hospital in Pittsburgh. This program began six years ago and was put into action by Gracey following the request of an employee who had read an article about the Vet Net.

North Hills REACT #12844 was the organization solely responsible for laying out the guidelines for the two veteran communication programs, as well as the program run two days a week at Harmarville Rehabilitation Center. The Harmarville program is more than four years old and began when a Harmarville employee contacted Gracey after learning about the programs at a rehabilitation conference in Portugal.

The primary service provided is for spinal cord injury patients who are preparing to return to an active role in society, but instruction is available for any patient who is interested.

"For partially paralyzed people who will be transporting themselves," explains Gracey, "we teach them the proper way to use a CB radio in case of an emergency."

Patients get instruction ranging from how to use the CB radio to what all the CB lingo means. They first practice with instructional tapes that simulate being on the air, followed by actually practicing over the air on Tuesday nights.

Gracey sees it as a way to provide a new "window on the world" for disabled adults who can no longer get around and communicate as easily as they used to. He sees the therapy his organization provides as a twoway street. The patient feels good, and they in turn feel good.

"When I go home at night, I'm beat," says Gracey. "But I'm up. I really have a lot of fun and feel real good about what I'm doing."

#2690 Twin City Emergency Communications, Lafayette, Indiana helped line up the participants again in the 9th Annual Wabash River Raft Race on Sunday, August 28. The race route was a four-mile stretch along the Wabash River from the Davis Ferry Bridge, north of Lafayette to Mascouten Park in West Lafayette. Each year the race participants are faced with new obstacles, some of which are caused by the weather. Those obstacles can make getting to the river and the race difficult.

Last year we had too much rain, but this year we haven't had enough. So, the new obstacle was that some areas of the river were very shallow and some of the rafts were too large to pass through them. Due to the drought there were ten less crafts entered this year than last year. A total of 58 crafts were entered, carrying about 200 crew members. All proceeds from this year's fair were donated to Home Hospital's Ambutatory Surgery Areas.

#4069 Effingham County REACT, Springfield, Georgia, retired unit number 18 in memory of loyal and valued member, Lillie Mae Webb. At 6:00 a.m. on March 1, 1978 Mrs. Webb turned on her CB and claimed the honor of being the first radio operator to go on the air for REACT in Effingham County. Over the years, she has monitored and aided people with CB radio, accumulating 24,225 hours of monitoring time. Mrs. Webb rarely missed a Team function and was always involved in the true spirit of REACT, providing assistance to travelers and persons in need by way of radio communications.

#C332 Herndon REACT, Vienna, Virginia, once again, at the request of Triathlon officials, provided safety/emergency radio communications for the Reston Triathlon. Sponsored by the Reston Hospital Center the event drew 450 people ranging from teenagers to senior citizens. There were as many volunteers as participants, including 14 lifeguards, 75 or 80 "marshals" monitoring the bicycle route, 40 uniformed police officers, half-dozen medical personnel, 19 Herndon REACTers, and about 150 others handing out water or standing by to offer assistance. The event began with a onemile swim at Lake Audubon, continued with a 23-mile bicycle race, and ended with a 6.2-mile run.

The event was on time but was marred by tragedy when officials could not account for

one swimmer at the completion of the swim race. As swimmers finished their swim and came out of the water, they turned over their race number, worn as a tag attached to their ankles, to waiting Triathlon officials and then grabbed their bicycles for the second leg of the event. When the last swimmer emerged from the water, officials began to worry. A single bicycle was left behind.

Triathlon officials determined from the number on the bicycle that the missing swimmer was a 17 year-old (male) high school junior. A Herndon REACT member remained on the scene until the Fairfax County Police divers determined the search would take many hours and little could be done but wait for police reports. The body of the youth was recovered from the Lake 9 days after the Triathlon.

#C663 Douglas County REACT, Omaha, Nebraska, was there when a fast moving storm developed over the central part of Omaha and produced three tornadoes that hit the west and central part of Council Bluff, Iowa. The city was very lucky: damage was heavy, but no lives were lost, and the number of injuries was low.

The tornado was first spotted by Unit 19, Steve Beckman, while in route to a weather watch point. Steve had to get out of his truck and wait for it to pass over before reporting it. This was the first confirmed sighting. The warning was given, but the storm had reached Council Bluff by that time. After the watch was cancelled, six to eight of our members were in Council Bluff Friday night and early Saturday morning, helping out with security patrol in the damage area. We were more than glad to help out and do our part for our neighbor city.

We have completed training of three new members, have visited with two more and have one more to complete his training. It is hoped that we can begin the process of growth again within our ranks and useage of the CB radio, as we feel there continues to be a need and use for the CB.

Disaster Aid Ordered for Texas

WASHINGTON — President Reagan declared a major disaster exists in Texas and ordered federal aid to assist people in the southern end of the state recover from the damaging side affects of Hurricane Gilbert which struck the area on September 16.

The President's action provides federal funding to supplement state and local recovery programs for individuals and businesses in Bexar, Cameron and Hidalgo counties. The areas were designated eligible for this aid by Julius W. Becton, Jr., director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), immediately following the declaration.

The assistance, to be coordinated by FEMA, can include temporary housing for those whose homes are uninhabitable; grants for individuals and families; low interest loans to cover uninsured private and business property losses; and other programs to help return the stricken area to pre-disaster conditions.

Robert D. Broussard of FEMA's regional office in Denton, Texas, was named in the declaration to coordinate federal recovery

operation in the affected area.



NDTA will voluntarily support Civil Defense

WASHINGTON — The 7,500-member National Defense Transportation Association (NDTA) will provide voluntary support to state and local governments that request assistance in civil defense and other emergency planning.

NDTA President Norman C. Venzke agreed to provide the assistance under a memorandum of understanding co-signed by Julius W. Becton, Jr., director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency

(FEMA).

The agreement cites portions of the National Security Decision Directive 259 which President Reagan signed in February, 1988. Among other provisions, the NSDD encourages voluntary participation by citizens and organizations to deal with crises which degrade or threaten national security.

According to the agreement document, members of the NDTA's 75 chapters represent the broadest cross-section of expertise on emergency transportation and logistics

management in the free world.

FEMA is the principal point of contact within federal government for emergency planning, response and recovery from natural and man-made disasters, including an attack against the country. It supports state and local response efforts.

Federal Aid Approved to Fight Oregon Fire

WASHINGTON — The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has authorized supplemental federal funds to help Oregon battle a fire which was determined to be a threat to populated areas in Josephine County.

FEMA approved the state's request for federal aid (August 26) to fight the Walker Mountain fire which began August 23 and has burned more than 1,000 acres of forest

and grasslands.

Under the authorization, the agency will pay 70 percent of the state's eligible firefighting costs that are above \$623,600. The figure, called a floor cost, is derived through a formula based on the state's five-year annual average cost for fighting fires.

Federal fire suppression aid, provided by the President's Disaster Relief Fund, is made available to assist in fighting fires when they threaten to cause a major disaster. The agency said it could not estimate the amount of federal money that will be needed to quell the Walker Mountain fire.

Federal Aid Approved to Fight Washington State Fire

WASHINGTON — The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has authorized supplemental federal funds to help Washington State battle a fire that is threatening the town of Entiat in Chelan County.

FEMA approved the state's request for federal aid (September 6) to fight the Dinkleman fire which began September 4 and has burned more than 35,000 acres of forest and grasslands.

Under the authorization, the agency will

pay 70 percent of the state's eligible firefighting costs that are above \$534,000. The figure, called a floor cost, is derived through a formula bsed on the state's five-year annual average cost for fighting fires.

Federal fire suppression aid, provided by the President's Disaster Relief Funds, is made available to assist in lighting fires when they threaten to cause a major disaster. The agency said it could not estimate the amount of federal money that will be needed to quell the Dinkleman fire.

Disaster Aid Approved for California

WASHINGTON — President Reagan approved federal disaster aid for California to assist people in the northern part of the state recover from damages caused by wildfires which started on September 11.

The President's major disaster declaration opens the way for use of federal funds to supplement state and local relief efforts in Nevada, Shasta, Solano and Yuba Counties. The areas were designated eligible for assistance to individuals, families and business owners by Julius W. Becton, Jr., director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), immediately after the declaration.

Federal aid can include temporary

housing, grants, low-interest loans to cover uninsured property and business losses, and other programs to help lire victims recover from the affects of the disaster.

FEMA and state disaster survey officials reported that more than 150 homes were destroyed by the wildfires which burned nearly 78,000 acres of forest and grasslands and caused the evacuation of over 4,000 people. Numerous other residences and businesses sustained varying degrees of damage, they said.

Joseph G. Del Monte of FEMA's regional office in San Francisco was named to coordinate federal recovery activities in the

stricken area.



NHTSA Publishes Final Reports on Ride Service Programs to Discourage Drunk Driving

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has published a user's guide dealing with ride service programs. Such programs are designed to provide motorists who have been drinking with a safe ride home without injuring themselves or others. The guide contains information that should be useful to state and local planners, including types of ride service programs available, operating methods, resources required, and possible problems and recommended solutions.

Also, a final technical report was published that should aid those readers who need more details about the study, including the methods used to identify ride service programs and to collect and analyze program information.

According to NHTSA, ride service programs, usually called "Dial-A-Ride" or "Sale Rides," can perform a valuable service to the community by providing a convenient alternative to driving while under the influence of alcohol.

The user's guide, entitled "A User's Guide to Ride Service Progams" (DOT HS 807 291) and the technical report, entitled "The Assessment of Ride Service Programs as an Alcohol Countermeasure" (DOT HS 807 290) can be obtained from the National Technical Information Service, 5285 Port Royal Rd., Springfield, VA. 22161. "A Directory of Ride Service Programs" (DOT HS 807 146), which provides information on key features and program spokespersons for 325 programs from 44 states and the District of Columbia, is available from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402.

Transportation Department, Seat Belt Council, Honor Richard Petty

Race car legend Richard Petty, long an advocate of safety belt use in motor vehicles, was honored Sept. 15, 1988 by Secretary of Transportation Jim Burnley and the American Seat Belt Council.

Petty, the "winningest" driver in stock car racing history, was presented with the Secretary's Award for Outstanding Public Service for his "continuing efforts to encourage and promote traffic safety."

Petty also was presented with the "Saved by the Belt" award by Charles H. "Chuck" Pulley, the president of the American Seat

Belt Council.

The North Carolina race driver, who recently celebrated his 30th anniversary in racing, accepted his awards at a ceremony in the DOT headquarters building in Washington.

Last February, Petty received only minor injuries in a severe crash during the Daytona. 500 race and he has survived other high-

speed crashes because he was protected by safety belts.

The Secretary's Award cites Petty for his safety accomplishments and reads, in part, "Your personal and professional use of automobile safety belts influences millions of Americans. Further, by emphasizing highway safety in your public appearances you contribute immeasurably to the goal of an accident-free transportation system."

Secretary Burnley praised Petty for his serious commitment to safety both on and off the racetrack and for sending a positive message that safety belt use is the single most important precaution motorists can

take."

The American Seat Belt Council instituted the "Saved by the Belt" award as a reminder



of the effectiveness of safety belts in preventing deaths and serious injuries in crashes.

in presenting the award to Petty, Pulley said the race car driver joins more than 8,000 survivors on the rolls of the American Seat Belt Council-sponsored "Saved by the Belt" clubs nationwide, including boxing champ Sugar Ray Leonard and recording star Barbara Mandrell.

Surveys conducted by the Department of Transportation show that safety belt use in the U.S. has increased dramatically in the last few years. Today, 42 percent of front seat occupants use belts and the increase in belt use is credited with saving 8,000 lives between 1983 and 1987. Thirty-two states and the District of Columbia have passed belt laws and all states require children to be protected in a child safety seat.

Rear-seat lap beits and correct safety beit use

Recent publicity about the safety of rearseat lap belts may have given the public the idea that no safety belt is better than a laponly belt. Here is some information which may help you deal with questions that come up in your education programs.

LAP-BELT FACTS

 A passenger is nine times more likely to survive a crash or escape serious injury if wearing a lap belt.

 Rear-seat lap belts are approximately 32 percent more effective in preventing fatalities than non-use.

 Rear-seat lap belts are approximately 36 percent more effective in reducing injuries than non-use.

 Rear-seat lap belts are approximately 40 percent effective nonfrontal crashes.

 Lap/shoulder safety belts already are availabe in many new domestically produced passenger cars and will be available in virtually all models by the 1990 model year.

 Last year, 2,077 rear-seat passengercar occupants died in traffic crashes. Of those, 18 percent wore belts and 82

percent were unrestrained.

 Lap belts saved an estimated 100 lives and prevented more than 1,500 serious injuries in 1987.

 If belt use was 100 percent, lap belts would have saved an estimated 660 lives and prevented more than 10,000 serious injuries last year.

 The fatality risk of passengers using rear-seat lap belts is estimated to be 24 to 40 percent lower than that of unbelted back-seat passengers.

Statistics are from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

During such times of disaster telelphone lines are either down or jammed and Citizens Band or GMRS is not intended for long distance communication. Thus REACT Amateur members in the affected areas could relay the activities and involvement of local REACT back to REACT HQ in Wichita. Kansas. This way REACT International could provide national media reports of REACT involvement in the disasters on a timely basis-when the media wants it, instead of after the fact when its yesterdays news.

Such national exposure would be of tremendous benefit to REACTs public service image.

#2037 Peninsula REACT, Newport News, Virginia, and #C-53 Tidewater, REACT, Portsmouth, Virginia, assisted the 100,000 visitors to this year's Bay Days celebration in Hampton, Virginia. A combined effort of 12 from Peninsula and 6 from Tidewater used CB, GMRS, and VHF Business radio services for a coordinated communications network. During the three days REACTers found 17 lost children, provided first aid for 15 people and even returned a stray dog to its rightful owner. Hampton Police made only a total of 24 arrests, mainly drunk and disorderly conduct in public. The low figures are contributed to the extra eyes and ears of REACT. The Teams' assistance in locating lost children and helping any way possible made it one of the safest Bay Day celebrations on record, according to Lt. R.L. Tugwell of the Hampton Police Department. Public service through communications was a key factor to the Hampton Roads area - to prove once again that REACT is an important part of the community.

#2336 New River Valley REACT, Radford, Virginia, started our "Christmas in July" project in 1986. The purpose is to provide clothing, shoes, toys, and school supplies for the most needy children in our community so they may be better prepared to start school.

We first contacted the local Social Service Department for 20 names of children in the most need. These names were then put on individual cards, along with the child's age, clothing size, and shoe size. Also included on the card was the date, time, location of the "Christmas in July" party and instructions on where to deliver the gifts.

These cards were then altached to Christmas trees and placed with local merchants. Patrons took a card(s) from the tree, bought and wrapped the gifts (in Christmas wrapping paper), then delivered them to the location indicated on the card. If a patron was unable to deliver the gifts, a telephone number was included on the cards and we would arrange to pick up the gifts.

Santa arrived in full attire at the party. The children's parents as well as participating patrons were invited. After the children ale, Santa and his helpers handed out the gifts. To see the children opening their gifts was the highlight of the project.

By 1988 this project has grown to include 41 children with an estimated \$7500 spent on gifts. Our local citizens have supported this project with very little cost to our Team.

Everyone is looking forward to next year's annual event at which time we hope to expand and include even more children.
