# REACTing with Citizens Patrol

With the addition of members from Norco Citizens Patrol, Crest RE-ACT of Southern California has peaked at its highest level of membership ever. NCP was formed a few months ago and needed good communications. A Crest GMRS repeater was able to provide it through REACT membership, and the relationship was established.

According to Commander Bob Seigler, Norco Citizens Patrol members undergo a background check, 16 hours of training including CPR, and 10 hours of ride along with the Riverside County Sheriff. Volunteers then spend a minimum of 16 hours per month as a two-person patrol in specially-marked vehicles, or at the dispatch office handling radio, telephone and other duties.

The approximately 40 men and women carry no weapons, make no arrests, or take no law enforcement action. They do, however, fulfill a needed function of looking for safety hazards, security problems, nuisances, suspicious activities, and provide public assistance. Members may also help the Sheriff and Fire Departments on request in such activities as traffic control, search, etc.

Businesses and individuals have indicated their appreciation of the deterrent effect on crime that this "eyes and ears" approach has. Statistics show a 6% drop in serious crime during the first month of NCP operation, attributed in part to this citizen involvement.

Crest REACT Secretary-Treasurer Ed Greany, a principal facilitator and radio trainer, said "it seemed such a natural to bring together these two volunteer organizations. REACT ben-



efits with new members, NCP gets radio training, insurance, and repeater use, while the entire community sees increased citizen involvement bringing about a reduction in crime." Our repeaters where up and operating but many of the non REACT Amateur operators who did not participate in any of our BORING events were not prepared to operate out in the wild without a shelter.

## Here is a short list of suggestions

- If you think you might want it, take it with you. This includes radios, scanners, antennas, headphones, cable, power supplies and extra batteries. (I have a bag with this in it that I can grab when going out the door. Most of this equipment is just for emergency communications).
- Paper, pencil and your Team roster with up to the date phone numbers.
- An AM-FM radio and if you have it a small TV set battery powered if possible. When you are out there a TV set will come in very handy for updates on

what is exactly happening especially if your assignment is out of the main hub of activity.

4. Take along anything for your own PERSONAL COMFORT!

## 5. BE PREPARED.

One of the biggest problems that we ran into

was too few people were willing to SIT DOWN, SHUT UP and LISTEN. I know most of you have heard it before, but just after the net control station has gone through a sometimes lengthy explanation or answer of a question it never fails...someone will immediately ask that same question.

Learn to become good listeners and less an expert on the push to talk button!

The primary purpose of the Internet, is Information. Exchanging ideas. But as a source of information, the Internet can really be confusing, "Information Overload" so to speak. Just out of curiosity, one day, I performed a search using my own last name as the key word. Whew! I didn't know I was so popular on the Internet. It found my name on every REACT web page that has been posted for REACT International, Texas State REACT Council, San Antonio REACT, and my personal pages. It also found my name on Rose City REACT's web page up in Windsor, Ontario.



DejaNews found the following

Author Profile on react@texas.net (Lee Besing): A total of 27 articles posted between 1995/07/08 and 1995/11/13 with 81% follow-ups. Plus it found 5 other postings by other authors who mentioned my name in their article. Articles posted with my address as originator to individual newsgroups were found in: 22 @ rec.radio.cb, 2 @ comp.sys.laptops, 1 @ rec.radio.swap, 1 @ rec.radio. scanner, and 1 @ nz.comp.

In addition to finding myself, it found my cousin, Joan Besing, a Speech and Pathology Professor at the University of Southern Alabama, a Roy Besing in Indiana, and a Paul Besing in Phoenix who was arranging for rental housing during the upcoming Super Bowl! Scary, or Exciting?

some instructions before you go, by visiting REACT International's home page, on the section dealing with "Other Web Links of Interest" at the bottom.

I found a non-REACT related page who linked his web page back to REACT's. This was a fellow named "Tyson" and his address was http://www.teleport.com/~tybrooks/cbradio.shtml. He saw us talking about REACT in the usenet group called "rec.radio.cb" and asked if he could mention REACT International on his listing of Radio Organizations. He sure didn't have to ask that question twice!

REACT members have discovered the use of E-Mail for sharing news of what is happening in their team or community. Recent postings included traffic accidents in Texas, searches for missing skiers in Oregon, and officer elections for Honolulu REACT C-010 and the Northern California REACT Council.

One inquiry was received from the United Kingdom, asking what equipment do REACT Teams in the USA utilize and how do we do what we do. Several teams jumped in to answer that question within the same day it was rebroadcast.

Announcements by Field Directors have been relayed via e-mail in addition to special mailings to all teams. REACT International's office now routinely fields requests via e-mail, without the delays of normal mailing.

Computers can expand your window to the world, if you learn how to use them. Twenty years ago, the big "bump in the road" was GMRS Radios. Ten years ago, it was Amateur Radio. This time, that bump will be the Computer.

RI Headquarters now has e-mail (electronic mail) capabilities for faster response without the cost of a long distance phone call or postage. While computer communications cannot, and will not, replace the need for radio communications, it has proven more reliable over long distance for the rapid and efficient transmission of data and exchange of ideas. With the advent of electronic communications allowing affordable and fast communications between members, Field Directors, and the REACT International HQ, some members have said that we have seen more continuing communications between members and the RI HQ in the past year than in the previous several years combined.

REACT International has the chance to continue the present trend of turning around our previous years of decline in membership, and rebuilding our organization. Communications between the top officers of our organization, RI HQ staff, the membership in general, and the public, is essential. # How to Vote in the Board of Director Election

- At your next Team meeting (regular or special) review the Board candidates qualifications and have your members indicate their choice of candidate to fill the <u>one</u> Board position up for election.
- Mark the official ballot with an "X" by the candidate of choice by your Team. You may vote for only
  one candidate on the ballot. <u>DO NOT</u> rank the candidates, vote for more than one candidate or make
  any other marks on your ballot.
- 3. Insert the ballot in the small envelope marked "Official Ballot Envelope" and seal it.
- 4. Insert the small "Official Ballot Envelope" into the pre-addressed election return envelope. <u>CERTIFY</u> your Teams vote by completing the <u>BACK</u> of the return envelope with your Team number, city, state, number of members participating, date of choice and two Team officer signatures.

NOTE: If your Team has one officer, please indicate this by checking the appropriate box on the return envelope so it will not be disqualified.

 Mail your Team's vote. Use first class or faster service. <u>NOTE</u>: Ballots must be received at the mailing address by noon on July 20th, 1996 to be counted.

Near the middle of 1976, a small group of concerned REACTers, fearing that Channel 9 was about to be abandoned by the group of which they were a part, got together to form Greater Anchorage REACT, Incorporated, Team Number 3462.

Nine meetings (coincidentally) were held to form and formulate what would become a group dedicated to providing the best possible Emergency and Motorist assistance over CB Channel 9.

Designator's were devised to identify members with their respective areas of home monitoring.

Bylaws were adopted and modified to better fit their particular situation.

While the culmination and efforts of 17 people formed the group, officially, <u>GAR</u> went "on-the-air" September 1, 1976 with 15 active Monitors.

Soon, the organization grew to 54 including a couple of Junior Members

Training by personnel from EMS, Police, Troopers, Air Force Rescue Coordination Center and the Anchorage Fire Department made us aware of the particular minimum information each agency needed when responding to a variety of calls.

In-house training classes were devised so when a probationary member went "on-the-air", not only did they have an understanding of what to expect, they also had a "coach" with some tenure to back them up in the event they experienced any difficulty with a particular call.

These calls have ranged from the mundane to contacting the Washington State Highway Patrol concerning a snowmobile accident in that state.

One call in particular comes to mind personally; a woman who, not having a telephone in her apartment rather a CB radio, called to report an elderly gentleman neighbor who had cut his throat from ear to ear. As the Fire Station was mere blocks away, paramedics arrived in under 10 minutes and were able to save his life.

Another involved a multi-car accident on the Bay Bridge in San Francisco. Thanks to "skip", one of our monitors picked up the call and relayed the information to the authorities in that area.

And, we can't forget the situation while a boat was adrift in Upper Cook Inlet, without any power save a portable CB. A member of the crew had been stung dozens of times by wasps. The CB most likely saved his life.

Our particular situation due to location and terrain, does make for some interesting calls and responses. Not many, we're sure, can equate with this.

As with any group, the next ten or so years produced its share of growing pains. The number in the group waned slowly then held steady for awhile.

We are to celebrate our 20th Anniversary this September. While we are less than that number in strength, we still monitor with the premise that, regardless of how many hours go by without a call, when that one call does come in, there is no way to be sure if life or property will be in danger until we key the microphone and ask: "May we help you?".

However, we are sure that the caller will most certainly appreciate our being "On-The-Air" for them when that time does come.

We are looking forward to our next score of calls.



# BREAK 9! Anybody out there...we need some help!!!

That call for help is very familiar to Flagler County Assist REACT members. From January 1, 1995 to October 31, 1995 the Team received and relayed 748 calls to law enforcement agencies. In 1994 the team tallied 808 calls.

There have been so many types of calls received that they are impossible to count. Recently the Team helped catch two drunk drivers. The first was caught when one of our members was on I-95 southbound. He spotted a vehicle that was all over the road. He contacted one of the Team's base stations on CB Channel 9. The Flagler County Sheriff's Department was contacted but did not have a unit in the area. Our mobile unit kept updating the base station with the location of the driver. The base station called the next county's Sheriff's Department. Our unit kept relaying information on to, two of the team's base stations. A Volusia County Deputy caught up to the suspected drunk driver and pulled him over. This individual was taken into custody after failing a field sobricty test.

The second incident started in Volusia County going north towards our county. Two truckers spotted a vehicle that was weaving all over the road. They called on CB Channel 9, a Flagler County Assist REACT base station responded and relayed the information to our Sheriff's Department. Several base stations working together tracked this vehicle until Flagler County Deputies could catch him. After failing the field sobriety test, another suspected drunk driver was off the road.

The Team also helps out
with searches for missing persons. The last search occurred
when an elderly woman wondered away
from her home around 11:30 at night.
The Team was called upon by the
Flagler County Sheriff's Department
to help out in the search. After three
hours the woman was found safe.

These are just a few examples of how our Team works with local law enforcement agencies.

Flagler County Assist REACT takes its' CB Channel 9 monitoring very seriously. It is why Flagler County Assist became a REACT Team and it is why REACT is here.

The Team also gives direct support to the Flagler County Department

of Emergency Management also referred to as the Emergency Operations Center (EOC). The Team is represented in the EOC's communications and warning division. Flagler County Assist REACT provides personnel at the EOC to operate the county and state radio systems during emergencies.

REACT Team #4800 is well represented in the community. The Team actively participants in public service events, severe weather spotting, and are called on to assist in searches for lost children and adults.

Our Team's main means of communications is the CB Radio. However, several members also have other communications such as Amateur radio, and the 27.490 MHz low band frequency, as well as cellular phones.

This will become an ongoing series.

# Travis County Controls Crowds at 10K Race

On March 24, members of Travis
County REACT Team #3022 of Austin, Texas, were assigned to crowd control duties at the 19th Annual Capitol 10K, "The People's Race", sponsored by the Austin American-Statesmen. Proceeds from the race go to Habitat for Humanity.

The race begins a block north of the State Capital with wheelchair racers starting at 8:30 a.m., "elite" runners at 8:45, and the "public race" at 9:00. TCR members, along with four members of Bexar County REACT and one each from San Antonio REACT and Canyon Lake REACT, gathered at 7:00 a.m., for assignments. Some members were sent to the starting area; the rest

were deployed to the finish line area.

Two members - Charlie and Patti Land (Units 542 and 540) - and prospective member Jimmy Conn were assigned to watch the entrance to a hotel two blocks from the starting line, where a few runners have congregated before past races to give themselves a bit of a head start. Fortunately, the only runners caught sneaking into the race this year wore white number tags, indicating that they were registered for the "public race", which is untimed anyway. None of the "elite" runners, who are timed and are eligible for prizes, were caught cheating.


One of the more notable runners was Texas Governor George W. Bush, who entered the "public race" and finished the 6-mile course in a little under 45 minutes, a respectable pace, and slightly better than his time last year.

As usual, there were a few reports of runners collapsing due to dehydration or exhaustion. The only serious incident was a runner who experienced a heart attack just after crossing the finish line. He collapsed very considerately in front of the medical tent! EMS personnel quickly revived him, and he was released from a local hospital two days later.

TCR members who participated included Stuart DeLuca, TCR President; Paula Coker, control operator; Jim Coker, Robert Wood, Marshall Spear, Bill Pittman, William Bothager, Roger Wines, JoAnn Wilson, and Charlie and Patti Land. Bexar County members were David Ennist, BCR President; Lee Besing (accompanied by his son, David), Alfred Fronefield and Donna Hardigee. Alfred and Donna operated the SAG truck following the 18,000-plus runners. Roy Botello of San Antonio REACT and Jim Luker of Canyon Lake REACT also helped. The Austin Radio Communications Club provided the use of their business-band repeater and several handheld radios.

# REACT International, Inc. Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 1995 and 1994

# Description of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Polices:

The Corporation is a nonprofit organization formed to develop and promote the use of the Citizens Radio Service and other personal radio services as an additional source of communication for emergencies, disasters, and other forms of aid to citizens. REACT is exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3).

a) Cash consists of \$14,866 in a checking account and \$100 in a petty cash fund.

# b) Investments

Investments are carried at market value. Investments consist of the following as of December 31:

# c) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of actual cost or market using the first-in, first-out basis of cost accumulation.

# d) Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is recorded at cost with the exception that donated equipment is recorded at its estimated fair market value at the time of donation. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful lives of the related assets, generally three to five years, and is calculated using the straight-line method.

## e) Deferred Income - Dues

Income from dues is being recognized in the year in which it relates. Income received, which pertains to the subsequent year, is credited to the liability account Deferred incomedues.

## f) Unearned/Earned Life Membership Dues

Since the inception of the life membership program, in 1980, \$82,429 has been received. The life membership dues are amortized over 20 years and allows an individual to be a member for his or her life without further dues. The amount amortized to date is \$39,110. The current amortization is \$4,119. There is no obligation on REACT International, Inc. to refund this money upon termination of the organization.

REACT is investing the amount not amortized on life members, and will use the earnings to cover the costs

associated with maintaining life members. The amount of \$43,319 (\$82,429-\$39,110) has been invested. Of the total investments in Note 1, \$43,319 is for life members and the remaining for REACT operations.

# 2) LEASE COMMITMENTS:

## Lease agreements for office space

On April 1, 1993, the Corporation renewed the existing lease agreement with respect to its Wichita, Kansas office for an additional three years. The term calls for the Company to pay monthly installments of \$550.

# Lease agreement for copier

On August 29, 1995, the Corporation entered into a lease agreement with respect to its' copier for 5 years. The terms call for the Company to pay monthly installments of \$432.00 starting in December 1995 and an initial security deposit of \$432.00 at inception.

# 3) <u>INVENTORY</u>:

## Obsolete inventory write off

In February 1995, the Board decided to write off obsolete inventory.

## Prior year inventory

The following amounts were paid to J.O. Pollack for inventory items sold in prior years. J.O. Pollack never billed REACT for the amounts until 1995.

## 4) BOARD OF DIRECTORS EXPENSES:

Board of Directors expenses include telephone conferences, expenses incurred in electing board members, travel and expenses for members to attend Board of Directors meetings and the annual convention.

In addition, a committee was set up during 1994 to define the purpose and long-range goals of REACT. The committee incurred \$10,916 of expenses which included (but is not limited to) supplies, travel, meals and mileage reimbursements. Consulting fees of \$5,000 were paid to the chairman of the committee. A report was prepared and submitted to the Board, which has taken its recommendations under advisement. The committee was disbanded upon completion of its tasks and no further expenses will be incurred.

# 5) INSURANCE:

During 1995 and 1994, REACT did not collect enough team insurance fees to cover the insurance premium for the liability and bonding. REACT paid \$5,849 and \$2,325, respectively to cover the teams, and will not recover the amount from the teams.

# 6) COMPENSATED ABSENCES:

Employees accumulate vacation leave benefits at the rate of one week for the first year and two weeks thereafter. Accumulated earned vacation leave at December 31, 1995 and 1994, amounted to \$640 and \$2,289, respectively. The liability for compensated absences has been recorded as an accrued liability in accordance with FASB Statement 43.
