

You WILL NOT NEED a REAL ID driver's license to come to Vegas in August!

On April 27[,] 2021, The federal government extended the deadline for enforcing the REAL ID[®] requirements to fly. This means that *REACT*ers travelling to Las Vegas for the 60th Celebration will not be required to have a REAL ID[®] compliant driver's license. If you do already have that license, so much the better but don't fret over it for the conference.

The new deadline is May 3rd, 2023. First time application for a REAL ID[®] must be made in person at your local driver's license agency office. Some states are allowing renewals to be done online. Check with your state.



Beginning May 3, 2023, federal agencies will enforce the REAL ID® Act, which requires a REAL ID®, U.S. passport or another federally approved identification to board commercial flights and enter secure federal buildings.

Please note: If your driver's license or state-issued ID expired on or after March 1, 2020, and you are unable to renew at your state driver's license agency, you may still use it as acceptable identification at the checkpoint. Due to the effects of COVID-19, the Transportation Security Administration will accept expired driver's licenses or state-issued ID a year after expiration.

REAL ID Is Completely Optional

You **do not need** a REAL ID® driver license or identification card to do any of the following:

- Drive
- Vote
- Apply for or receive federal benefits (e.g., Veterans Affairs, Social Security Administration, etc.)
- Enter a federal facility that does not require an ID (e.g., a post office)
- Access a hospital or receive life-saving services
- Participates in law enforcement proceedings or investigations (e.g., serve on a federal jury, testify in federal court, etc.)

A REAL ID®, however, might be helpful for anyone who frequently:

- Boards a commercial airplane;
- Visits nuclear sites;
- · Visits military bases, or
- Visits federal courthouses, federal prisons or other federal facilities

Keeping all of this in mind, we will see you in Vegas on August 8th!

"GORDON WEST on REAL EMERGENCY RADIO CALLS" (appearing by Zoom at the conference)

Hear radio operators transmitting life and death radio calls during emergencies, including fires, floods, tsunamis, car crashes, and the first 911 call over two way radio. All calls were real, and offer good training on how the operator signaled for help.

Gordon West goes back to UHF CB in the early '50s, then on to 27 MHz with 11W1769, 11W2534, and KMX8483.

West was a founding member of San Pedro *REACT*, when Hallacrafters started the program. His favorite rigs were a Class A CB Vocaline, Class D CB International Crystal "Ice Box". He later added Ham Radio training as a lifelong hobby.

Keeping REACT Team Activities Going During the On-Going Pandemic

REACT is a communications organization!

After all, the word communications is embedding the organization's name and motto, *Public Service Through Communications*.

However, in many regions, the public service part may be constrained by the ongoing pandemic, some areas more so than others. What can we do to keep teams active?

Firstly, being a communications-based organization, we are at an advantage given that our main tools are the various communications technologies. Such technologies allow for interaction no matter where our members are...and this includes anywhere around the world. Radio communications and voice over IP (VoIP), allow us to engage with each other and maintain contact. Whether we use commercial LMR, FRS, GMRS, Amateur Radio, CB Radio or Zello, for example, we are able to communicate. Some Teams are fortunate to have repeater systems that extend the range of coverage to wide geographical areas that go beyond the simplex range, and others have interfaces using RF backhaul or IP-based links that extend to state-wide, country-wide and even global coverage. There is also a need to bolster our resilience to cater for emergency and disaster communications, so having multiple tools in the tool kit as well as using robust systems, with simplex-relay or messaging systems (e.g., Winlink) become a major advantage. These should all be exercised regularly and can be the basis of activity for Teams.

Some Teams and Councils may have monthly or weekly nets on their various communications options/channels. Perhaps, increasing the frequency of such Nets can result in heightened activities. Apart from the routine Net Control station taking check-ins and announcements, an educational aspect with training and discussion can take place, once appropriate to do so. For instance, after the traditional net script is followed, a "TechNet" component can be added where the Net Control station or another participant makes a presentation. There is no shortage of training material. compendium of *REACT* courses downloadable from the website will provide many hours of content. Each net could feature a 15-30 minute snippet of a course. Doing so can also serve to promote these courses so that members are aware of them, what they contain, as well as to encourage the taking of the exams. Other course content can be the ICS 100, 200, 700, and 800 and CERT manual, which are very relevant to REACT. The better informed and more well trained our members are, the greater value we can add to communities and served agencies.

REACT hosts the following nets, and members are encouraged to consider participating:

- 2. **REACT** EchoLink Net: Saturdays at 0100 UTC (8 pm EST, 9 pm EDT), Zello Channel: **REACT MEMBERS**. All communicators are welcome.

Please spread the word about the nets. Did you know that Zello has a new logo?




Yet another option that merges communications technology with training is to conduct exercises/drills. The key would be to familiarize participants with what is expected, conduct the drill, evaluate the gaps and use the lesson learned to develop standard operating procedures (SOPs) and to inform the Team's training needs analysis.

This column has espoused, long before the pandemic, the benefits that virtual teleconference bridges and collaboration software present tremendous opportunities to *REACT* Teams to meet virtually. Zoom, Microsoft Teams, Google Meet are among the popular options. Of course, each platform has its pros and cons, so *REACT* Teams need to adopt the most suitable solution that work. Assist members who may not be entirely up to speed with the technology. Have virtual practice sessions so that members can get accustomed to the use and features as well as best practices such as muting the microphone until ready to speak and trying to join meetings from a quiet place.

On Saturday 18th December 2021, a special virtual end-of-year get-together was held via the Zoom platform, with live stream to YouTube. The event was mostly informal and a lot of fun. It was great to meet up and see members who we have either never met in person, or we have not interacted with for a while. Members, prospectives, and friends from all over the world stopped by to extend greetings and chit-chat. We also had a sneak-peek preview from President John Capodanno about what to expect with the upcoming 60th Anniversary celebration and Convention to be held at the Aria, Las Vegas on the 8th August 2022. It was announced that one of the guest speakers would be Gordon West, WB6NOA, well known in the amateur radio world as an author of training

material for the exams. Many licenced hams today owe their success to him. It was also mentioned that the fees for attending the Convention, though non-refundable once the event is held, but will be fully refunded should, for any reason, the event can no longer be held.



Recruitment of new members is important to bolster a Team's capability to function. In areas without a *REACT* presence, the aim should be to encourage citizens to form Teams and receive a Charter from *REACT* International, Inc. Promotion of the organization's aims and objectives would be key. The use of personal advocacy, flyers, banners, presentations as appropriate can all help in the recruitment process. Friends, family, co-workers, associates, other groups are all potential prospective *REACT* members. *REACT* members that are embedded in communities are a valuable source of confirmed information in the event of a disaster, where verified situation reports can be communicated, when seconds count, to served agencies and first responders, so those who need immediate assistance can get it in a timely manner.

Social media is a great way to interact, though there can be challenges. Consider utilizing the existing presence such as the *REACT* International, Inc Facebook Page or the *REACT* Members Facebook Group. Share you *REACT* team activities and see what other fellow *REACT* ers around the world are doing.

NIMS and the Incident Command System


REACT Internationals Role

During 2011 and 2012, the Board of Directors of REACT International, Inc. sought to strengthen our organization's commitment to the concepts and principles set forth in the National Incident Command System (NIMS, Presidential Directive HSPD-5). REACT recognizes and acknowledges the importance of the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and the Incident Command System (ICS) in the performance of missions at the team level. While not directly affected, many teams serve local agencies that fall under these Federal NIMS requirements. Teams have in the past been encouraged by the Board of Directors to take FEMA NIMS training online. Your current membership card now contains a checklist of these classes and whether you have received credit for taking them.

REACT Internationals Response

REACT International publishes the REACT Teams NIMS Resource Guide in 2013 to work towards

- Standardizing REACT resources.
- Preparing for improved national, regional and local response/deployment.
- Tying our resource typing levels to a program of certification.
- Encouraging teams to increase membership training and capabilities.





National Incident Management System (NIMS)

The National Incident Management System (NIMS) is a systematic, proactive approach to guide all levels of government, REACT and other nongovernmental organizations (NGOs), and the private sector to work together to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from the effects of incidents. NIMS provides a consistent foundation for all incidents, ranging from daily occurrences to incidents requiring a coordinated Federal response.

NIMS is organized into three major components:

- Resource Management
- Command and Coordination including the Incident Command System (ICS)
- Communications and Information Management



NIMS is designed to be:

- Flexible, to work in all incidents
- Standardized, to provide a coordinated, efficient response to each incident

The illustration below gives a broad overview of what NIMS is and is not.

Incident Command System (ICS)

The NIMS model for incident management is the Incident Command System (ICS). ICS is a standardized onscene emergency management organization designed to aid in the management of resources during incidents. The ICS model is used by jurisdictions and agencies, both public and private, to organize field-level incidentmanagement operations. ICS is sometimes referred to as the Incident Management System (IMS); the terms are interchangeable.

When organizations use the ICS model as the basis for their disaster planning, they adopt predefined management hierarchy, processes, and protocols that come into play in an emergency:

- The elements of the ICS model were developed and refined from actual incidents.
- This common approach enables organizations using ICS to integrate their response with other organizations that are also using ICS.


ICS Command Structure

The ICS command structure provides an orderly chain of command that is consistent across responding organizations. This chain of command may have either a single person, the Incident Commander (IC), at its head, or a multi-agency team, which is referred to as Unified Command. All other elements of the command structure are the same, regardless of how it is commanded.

Below incident command are the four major functional areas, as shown in the following graphic. The fifth major functional area, Command, is the responsibility of the Incident Commander or Unified Command. Each functional area is known as a section and is headed by a section chief.

Command Develops incident objectives and approves resource orders

- Operations
 Identifies, assigns, and supervises the resources needed to accomplish the incident objectives
- **Planning**Tracks resources
- Logistics
 Orders resources
- Finance/Administration
 Procures and pays for resources



Emergency Support Functions (ESFs)

The five functional areas are further categorized into 15 emergency support functions (ESFs), each associated with specific emergency-response activities. This ensures a consistent command and reporting structure for

these activities. The use of ESFs also helps responding organizations identify exactly where their resources and activities fit into the larger incident response.

Emergency Support Functions describe federal coordinating structures that group resources and capabilities into functional areas most frequently needed in a national response. Incident Action Plan (IAP)

The Incident Commander (or Unified Command) is responsible for preparing the Incident Action Plan (IAP) with the input from the section chiefs. The IAP describes how resources will be used to respond to a specific incident.

The IAP also includes mechanisms for:

- Setting priorities
- Integrating functions
- Establishing relationships
- Ensuring that systems put in place support all incident management activities

Resource Management

In the ICS model, resources for the response to an incident include:

- Personnel
- Facilities
- Equipment and supplies

A critical and very useful element of the ICS is that all of these resources are organized and identified by kind and type:

- Kind: Describes what the resource is (e.g., medic, firefighter, Planning Section Chief, helicopters, ambulances, combustible gas indicators, bulldozers)
- Type: Organizes resources by capability. Type 1 is generally considered to be more capable than Types 2, 3, or 4, respectively, because of size, power, capacity, or, in the case of incident management teams, experience and qualifications

This standardization is intended to ensure that all organizations responding with the ICS identify resources in the same way. That is, when Agency A requests a specific resource from Agency B, both agencies know exactly which resource is needed.

ICS Training

The following recommended minimum training in the ICS for REACT International Members is

- IS-100, Introduction to Incident Command System
- IS-200, ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incidents
- IS-700, National Incident Management System: An Introduction
- IS-800, National Response Plan: An Introduction

\$300 for a Life Membership. ARRL charges the following for

their Life Membership<mark>s:</mark>

US Life -- \$1225

Canada Life -- \$1559

International (non-US or Canada) -- \$1900

Holy Cow!!

As for benefits, we have a magazine, they have a magazine. We vocate for our members in various ways and so do they. We provide \$2,000,000/\$4,000,000 liability insurance as part of our dues (for only \$10 per member extra). ARRL provides a smaller amount for \$500 extra per organization (sorry, I don't know what they call their groups that we call Teams).

So, the next time you think that *REACT* dues are too expensive, remember these facts.

Comparatively, we're a pretty good bargain!


