

You WILL NOT NEED a REAL ID driver's license to come to Vegas in August!

On April 27[,] 2021, The federal government extended the deadline for enforcing the REAL ID[®] requirements to fly. This means that *REACT*ers travelling to Las Vegas for the 60th Celebration will not be required to have a REAL ID[®] compliant driver's license. If you do already have that license, so much the better but don't fret over it for the conference.

The new deadline is May 3rd, 2023. First time application for a REAL ID[®] must be made in person at your local driver's license agency office. Some states are allowing renewals to be done online. Check with your state.



Beginning May 3, 2023, federal agencies will enforce the REAL ID® Act, which requires a REAL ID®, U.S. passport or another federally approved identification to board commercial flights and enter secure federal buildings.

Please note: If your driver's license or state-issued ID expired on or after March 1, 2020, and you are unable to renew at your state driver's license agency, you may still use it as acceptable identification at the checkpoint. Due to the effects of COVID-19, the Transportation Security Administration will accept expired driver's licenses or state-issued ID a year after expiration.

REAL ID Is Completely Optional

You **do not need** a REAL ID® driver license or identification card to do any of the following:

- Drive
- Vote
- Apply for or receive federal benefits (e.g., Veterans Affairs, Social Security Administration, etc.)
- Enter a federal facility that does not require an ID (e.g., a post office)
- Access a hospital or receive life-saving services
- Participates in law enforcement proceedings or investigations (e.g., serve on a federal jury, testify in federal court, etc.)

A REAL ID®, however, might be helpful for anyone who frequently:

- Boards a commercial airplane;
- Visits nuclear sites;
- · Visits military bases, or
- Visits federal courthouses, federal prisons or other federal facilities

Keeping all of this in mind, we will see you in Vegas on August 8th!

"GORDON WEST on REAL EMERGENCY RADIO CALLS" (appearing by Zoom at the conference)

Hear radio operators transmitting life and death radio calls during emergencies, including fires, floods, tsunamis, car crashes, and the first 911 call over two way radio. All calls were real, and offer good training on how the operator signaled for help.

Gordon West goes back to UHF CB in the early '50s, then on to 27 MHz with 11W1769, 11W2534, and KMX8483.

West was a founding member of San Pedro *REACT*, when Hallacrafters started the program. His favorite rigs were a Class A CB Vocaline, Class D CB International Crystal "Ice Box". He later added Ham Radio training as a lifelong hobby.



Learn how the Los Angeles County Sheriff Department Search and Rescue teams use Technology to Aid in Search and Rescue Operations. There are many different ways to search for someone lost in the forest. Searching for footprints, clues, and signs, of someone being in a particular area very vital parts of any successful search and rescue operation, however, in the 21st century, there are many technological aspects of searching that come into play. Knowing if anyone is in a specific area or not comes easily with the information gathered from cell phone providers, which is then RF mapped to determine possible areas a subject may be in. In other times using LIDAR technology to "paint" a hillside in 1-2 Hour differentials to determine anything in the first picture that has moved in the second picture. In cases where we are looking for an aircraft that has gone down we go out and DF for the plane's ELT. There are numerous ways Search and Rescue teams are able to deploy technology in the forefront of an operation to help use our time the most efficient way possible to aid in helping our patients as fast as possible.




Preparations for a Tropical Storm

The **Atlantic Hurricane Season** runs from 1st June to 30th November each year. *REACT* members are always in a state of readiness to respond to any emergencies or disasters, including those that may occur from weather-related hazards. Towards the end of June 2022, one such risk faced the twin-island nation of Trinidad and Tobago (TnT).

The terminology and sequence that goes along with weather systems that bring rain, wind, and lighting can lead to much confusion. The accompanying possibility of flooding, landslides, roofs being blown off, and other types of property damage, not to mention the potential for injuries or loss of life, are real. This month's article will touch on these topics and report on one such system in which REACT members were ready to respond.




Forecast track for Potential Tropical Cyclone 2. Source: Earth Networks.

During the Hurricane Season, it is typical for tropical waves to form off the coast of Africa and proceed westwards across the Atlantic towards the Caribbean, Central, and North America. Tropical waves can also form anywhere in between, often starting as a surface trough, an area of disturbed weather. Rainfall, wind, and lightning are usually associated with such systems. The system can also escalate whereby barometric pressure starts to fall, wind speed increases, rainfall intensifies, and a closed circulation may occur. Progression can go from tropical wave, tropical depression, tropical storm, and hurricane (category 1 to 5). Before a system becomes categorized as a tropical storm or hurricane, the official weather bureau may declare a potential tropical cyclone, if they suspect the system is very likely to develop and is a sort of "heads up" to monitor closely, make preparations and to issue early watches or warnings. Hurricane Hunter aircraft are usually deployed to fly into the system to investigate and determine the wind speed, pressure, and if there is closed circulation.

Watches imply that a system is likely to affect an area in 48 hours or less, while a warning indicates that the adverse weather is 36 hours out or less. When citizens are placed on alert, *REACT* is usually already monitoring and making preparations. Such weather systems tend to give some advance warning, so that action can be taken in advance. Pre-event, *REACT* members ensure their homes and family are secure, double-check their equipment, verify go-kits and rations are ready, communicate with served agencies, and stand up radio networks. During the event, members hunker down and operate only if possible to do so safely. Post-event, response action is taken. If pre-positioned at an Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) or Incident Command Post (ICP), communications is established to deal with priority traffic. If not pre-positioned, but rostered, members are then deployed according to assignment, primary or secondary, and operate on the designated frequencies, modes, and agency.

Responding to an emergency or disaster can mean long hours, so it is important to have a shift system, with relief planned and implemented where possible. Members must also take care of themselves, so they stay healthy and safe to be able to continue assisting for the duration. Resources post-disaster can be constrained, so it is recommended that members be self-sufficient with refreshments for at least 72 hours in the event that catering arrangements are unavailable. Rest is also important, although with adrenaline flowing, it can sometimes be an afterthought, especially when the focus is on helping affected persons.

REACT members, in order to work effectively with served agencies, should be familiar with structures such as the National Incident Management System (NIMS), including the associated Incident Command System (ICS) and Unified Command (UC). Training is therefore key, and all REACT teams should strive to educate the membership and encourage everyone to become familiar with the various emergency management systems. REACT recommends at a minimum ICS 100, 200, 700, and 800 as per the ID cards.



Incident Command System (ICS) Structure. Source: FEMA


All prior preparation efforts, training, exercise, and drills came to bear during the period

23rd – 29th June 2022, when a strong tropical wave appeared likely to develop further and threatened to affect TnT.

On the 21st June 2022, observers identified a strong tropical wave coming off the African continent that had a low latitude. Close monitoring by the various meteorological agencies resulted in early concern being expressed given the conditions in the Atlantic. Low vertical wind shear, low dry/Saharan air, rapid forward movement, warm sea surface temperature, significant moisture/humidity/precipitable water, etc., suggested that the system was ripe for development.

REACT members sprung into action. The REACT Trinidad and Tobago Council, led by REACT Team 6005's President, Rohan Rampersad, REACT Unit 501, began to coordinate efforts. All Teams were engaged to liaise with their assigned Disaster Management Units (DMUs) of the 14 municipal corporations, as well as the Office of Disaster Preparedness and Management (ODPM) and the Tobago Emergency Management Agency (TEMA). As time progressed, Potential Tropical Cyclone 2 status was advised, and a subsequent Tropical Storm Warning was issued.

A virtual preparation and readiness meeting was held on with all 9 Teams in attendance.

A matrix of communication and roster was developed that included all Teams. Communication equipment was configured at various EOCs, and pre-positioning of members occurred. Fortunately, the system passed without much strengthening, and though there were some areas of TnT that experienced flooding, landslips, and blown-off roofs, the damage was nowhere what it could have been had the system intensified with a direct hit. That system went on to become Hurricane Bonnie and, at the time of writing, was a Category 3 Hurricane located in the Eastern Pacific. We are early in the season.

Let's continue to REACT!
